

Guide for Students on the Ethical Use of Generative AI Tools

Can be used as a guide for students to evaluate the use of AI in your course

To be an ethical user of AI tools, I must ask the following questions...

1	<p>How and why am I going to use the tool? (To replace or enhance?)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - I use the AI tool to enhance my learning and creativity, not to replace it: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> I use the AI tool for rote or procedural skills <input type="checkbox"/> I use the AI tools when they are appropriate (see above) and not as a means to complete work at the last minute 	
2	<p>Have I been given permission to use the tool in that context?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - I use the AI tool only when it has been explicitly allowed by the instructor, and do not assume that it is permitted in all contexts: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> o When I am unsure if AI tool use is permitted, I seek clarification from my instructors 	<input type="checkbox"/>
3	<p>Is my intention to learn or to just get a grade?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - I reflect on my use of the AI tool throughout the process: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> I seek to understand how it enhanced my learning <input type="checkbox"/> I seek to understand how it limited my learning 	
4	<p>Do I know how to use the tool?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - I understand the tool's capabilities and limitations, as well as the terms, conditions, and privacy policies associated with the tool. 	<input type="checkbox"/>
5	<p>Do I understand the strengths and limitations of the tool?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - I treat generative AI output as a secondary source of information that is not always accurate and take steps to critically evaluate its output: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> I attribute ideas and products to their original author or source, <input type="checkbox"/> I check all AI output for accuracy by doing an external 	

	search for the original author or source

1	Are there other ways to do this WITHOUT AI tools?	<input type="checkbox"/>
2	Is the output biased? Is the output accurate (or is it hallucinating)?	<input type="checkbox"/>
3	Is there a better prompt? Can I ask a different or better question?	<input type="checkbox"/>
4	Am I acquiring the learning objectives of the course or assignment by using the AI tool?	<input type="checkbox"/>
5	Where did the output come from (source, authorship)? Are the sources AI utilized accurate?	<input type="checkbox"/>
6	Have I vetted alternative perspectives?	<input type="checkbox"/>
7	Am I using the tool appropriately according to the instructions provided?	<input type="checkbox"/>

1	Are my original ideas present in my work?	<input type="checkbox"/>
2	Am I spreading misinformation or perpetuating harmful ideas, biases, etc.?	<input type="checkbox"/>
4	How did this assignment (and use of AI tools) help me advance my understanding of the content or learning objectives?	<input type="checkbox"/>
5	<p>Have I been transparent about my use of AI tools?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - I am transparent about where, how, and why I used the tool(s): <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> I cite the tool(s) in my work, <input type="checkbox"/> I explain how I used the tool(s) in my work 	

6	Have I cited original authors and sources appropriately?	<input type="checkbox"/>
7	Have I cited my use of the AI tool appropriately?	<input type="checkbox"/>
8	Have I plagiarized (knowingly or unknowingly)?	<input type="checkbox"/>
